



Piera M. Weiss is a landscape architect and planner with 30 years of experience in both the public and private sectors. Trained in classical languages as an undergraduate, she received a Masters Degree in Landscape Architecture from Cornell University in 1980 and has been a registered landscape architect in Maryland since 1985. A planner with The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission for 25 years, she has been responsible for three large-scale master plans, including the recently approved White Flint Sector Plan (March 2010), a proposed mixed-use, transit-oriented, sustainable community in the heart of Montgomery County, Maryland.

She taught garden design, plant materials, and construction for ten years in George Washington University's Landscape Design Program and has presented lectures at area conferences and seminars on planning topics such as the 1901 McMillan Commission Park Plan for the Capital City, the 1888 Washington, D.C. Master Plan of Highways, the 1918 Rock Creek Park Plan and the 1931 Highway and Park Plan for Montgomery and Prince George's Counties. For the last ten years, she has served as secretary of the Cultural Landscape Foundation, a non-profit organization dedicated to educating the general public on all aspects of the landscape.
